MEET OUR SPEAKER

Rob Esterlein is the Chief Operating Officer for the Admiral Nimitz Foundation in Fredericksburg, which supports and manages the National Museum of the Pacific War. Rob is a native of Fort Worth who joined the Navy in 1970, served three WESPAC tours and participated in three manned spacecraft recoveries. He earned a degree in history from the University of Texas at Arlington with specialties in Medieval Greek studies and cultural anthropology. Entering the museum business by mistake in 1983, he has been involved in museum operations and development ever since.

The National Museum of the Pacific War in Fredericksburg, Texas is the only institution in the United States dedicated exclusively to telling the story of the Pacific Theater in World War II. Ten years in planning and development, the Admiral Nimitz Foundation is preparing to open an expanded facility appropriate to the importance of the Pacific War in American history and to the role of the Museum in preserving and communicating that history.

"A large percentage of young Americans do not have... the type of understanding that fosters informed citizenship and enlightened understanding of national and world events, and that grasps the unprecedented national effort and commitment, the leadership, and the extraordinary labors of millions of Americans during the Pacific War. To sustain and revive this understanding within a large and diverse public is a visionary goal, but a worthwhile one."

The new exhibits for the George H. W. Bush Gallery... will be the single most comprehensive and engaging exhibit on Pacific War history ever created. In addition to the traditional visitor experience built around the Museum's unmatched collection of Pacific War artifacts; numerous galleries will employ large screen multi-media presentations, animated maps, narration and theatrical lighting to create high impact experiences. This extensive use of new media is intended to communicate the true nature and history of the Pacific war on a visceral level that traditional static museum exhibits may not reach, and to assure that younger visitors have the opportunity to connect with one of the most important moments in the history of the United States and the world."

WALKING YOUR BEAT

A friend of mine is a Lutheran pastor-sharp, energetic, highly committed to ministry, deeply caring. Folks admire him and respond quickly and faithfully to his leadership. Although the word "successful" is a word with many definitions and connotations, I believe we can say truthfully that he is successful in his role as teacher/preacher/pastor because of his credibility.

I asked him about his leadership style, somehow believing a successful leader had to have a recognizable, coherent, even academically defined style. Here is what he said, "Ernie, I manage by walking around." Was this thought original with him? I don't know, but I suspect that one influence could have been Acts 10:38 which tells us Jesus "went about doing good." What I do know is that this management style worked for him.

When a leader is out "walking around" purposefully, intentionally, attentively, he/she begins to see in a new way and, in turn, is seen in a new way. As has been said over and over, "It is amazing what we can see if we will just look."

At first, some folks may be suspicious of the "walking around" and see it as checking up on things, or even just being lazy—both of which can have a negative connotation. But with an open, inviting, friendly disposition, the walker can dispel such thoughts.

Stop and visit with folks. Get to know names, jobs, family matters. The leader has an opportunity too, for sharing about personal and job life. Bonding begins to take place as hearts and minds open and meet in common understanding. Folks are often reluctant to come to the office in some official capacity or speak up in a formal situation, but generally are much more at ease in the neutral territory of the BX, coffee shop, flight line, athletic field, grocery, library, or even the neighborhood and in our very own family.

All of us are aware of how vital it is to have a sense of connection, belonging, and cohesion. We want to live and work where the trust level is high and builds security. Everyone grows and matures in this environment. Folks have an investment in each other and decision making becomes more lively and to the point. Stability and efficiency are workplace results. Inner calm and improved lifestyle are personal results.

Maybe we spend too much time reading leadership and management material to the neglect of engaging first hand in interpersonal relations. That person "over there" does matter. What he/she thinks, believes, does or does not do really does matter. God cares for all his children. However, the primary concern held currently by this person just may be, "Does it matter to anybody who I am? What I am doing? How I am?" To say YES is to be on the road to a positive outcome. THE AID & ATTENDANCE PROGRAM

The Aid and Attendance (A&A) Special Pension provides benefits for veterans and surviving spouses who require the regular attendance of another person to assist in eating, bathing, dressing and undressing or taking care of the needs of nature. It also includes individuals who are blind or a patient in a nursing home because of mental or physical incapacity. Assisted care in an assisting living facility also qualifies.

The A&A Pension can provide up to \$1,632 per month to a veteran, \$1,055 per month to a surviving spouse, or \$1,949 per month to a couple*.

Eligibility must be proven by filing the proper Veterans Application for Pension or Compensation. This application will require a copy of DD-214 (see below for more information) or separation papers, Medical Evaluation from a physician, current medical issues, net worth limitations, and net income, along with out-of-pocket Medical Expenses.

A DD-214 is issued to military members upon separation from active service. DD-214s were issued to separated service members beginning in the 1950's. The term "DD-214" is often used generically to mean "separation papers" or "discharge papers", no matter what form number was used to document active duty military service. If the VA has a copy of a DD-214, it is usually because the veteran attached a copy (or sometimes, the original) to his or her application for disability or education benefits. If you've lost your original DD-214 or a copy and you are receiving (or applied for in the past) disability or education benefits from the VA, they may have a copy (or the original, if you gave it to them) on file. At the very least, if you are currently receiving benefits (or did in the past), they should be able to provide a Statement of Service, which can be used instead of a "DD-214".

CENSUS 2010

The census is a count of everyone living in the United States every 10 years. The next one will be in the summer of 2010. Your participation in the census is required by law. The 2010 Census questionnaire will be one of the shortest in history, consisting of 10 questions. It should take less than 10 minutes to complete, and federal law protects the personal information you share during the census. Census data are used to distribute Congressional seats to states, to make decisions about what community services to provide, and to distribute \$400 billion in federal funds to local, state and tribal governments each year. Here are some basic cautionary notes for you to be aware of:

If a U.S. Census worker knocks on your door, they will have a badge, a handheld device, a Census Bureau canvas bag, and a confidentiality notice. Ask to see their identification and their badge before answering their questions. However, you should never invite anyone you don't know into your home. Census workers are currently only knocking on doors to verify address information. Don't give your Social Security number, credit card or banking information to anyone, even if they say it's for the U.S. Census.

While the Census Bureau might ask for basic financial information, such as a salary range, they will not ask for Social Security, bank account, or credit card numbers nor will employees solicit donations. Eventually, Census workers may contact you by telephone, mail, or in person at home.

The Census Bureau will not contact you by email, so be on the lookout for email scams impersonating the Census. Never click on a link or open any attachments in an email that are supposedly from the U.S. Census Bureau.

Chairman of the Board

In the late 1700's, many houses consisted of a large room with only one chair. Commonly, a long wide board folded down from the wall, and was used for dining. MOAA Fights TRICARE Inpatient Fee Hike:

Assured by Defense leaders earlier this year that they wouldn't seek any TRICARE fee increases for FY2010, MOAA was shocked and disappointed when the Defense Department announced, on Sept 30, that it would be raising the inpatient copay for retired TRICARE Standard beneficiaries by \$110 per day (from \$535 to \$645) as of Oct 1.

That same day, MOAA sent a letter to Secretary Gates asking him to rescind the increase. On Oct 2, MOAA sent letters to House and Senate Armed Services Committee leaders asking them to prohibit any FY2010 increases and get additional data to evaluate adjustment methodologies for inpatient copays and TRICARE Reserve Select premiums. You can help by sending your legislators a letter.

VA warns of telephone scam

Officials at the Department of Veterans Affairs [VA] are warning people not to give credit card numbers over the phone to callers claiming to be updating VA prescription information. Callers state they represent the "Patient Care Group" helping administer VA prescriptions and they are therefore requesting veteran credit card numbers for prescription payments in advance of filling their prescriptions. This is false. VA does not call veterans asking to disclose personal financial information over the phone. VA has not changed its processes for dispensing prescription medicines. Anyone who receives such a call seeking a credit card number should simply hang up.

What to do (and not to do)
Immediately After the Death of a Loved One

Dear Readers,

Everyone realizes that the death of a loved one presents various emotional struggles that must be dealt with. An important, and often overlooked, truth is that while the emotional toll of death upon family and friends is great, there are some practical choices that must be made promptly during this difficult time. The families of a deceased veteran may not be aware of their special opportunities and often arrangements are made without this valuable information. We present you with the following list so that you may begin to see how critical this time is, and also, in the hopes that preparation will make this time of bereavement easier for you when you are confronted by it.

Funeral decisions:

Many times surviving spouses or children will spend more money than necessary at the funeral home. If there is not a prepaid plan, bring someone with you to help make arrangements. This is an emotional situation that should not be dealt with on your own.

Military veterans are eligible for military honors and a memorial flag. These honors are usually arranged by your funeral director, but a request from the family is absolutely necessary. This request for military honors should be mentioned to the funeral director, to your family and to your pastor, during Pre-Planning. Veterans and spouses are eligible for burial in National Cemeteries. <http://www.militaryfuneralhonors.osd.mil/faqpage.html>

Many benefits are available to families of deceased service members and veterans. To prepare for this uncontrollable event, go find your DD Form 214 today and put it with your other Estate Planning Documents, including your Will, Deed to your Home, Powers of Attorney, Directives and Financial Statement. A \$2000 death benefit is available to assist veteran's families with expenses related to burial and funeral. <http://www.vba.va.gov/survivors/>

Social Security:

If the deceased person receives Social Security benefits at the time, giving notice of death to Social Security may prevent confusion and result in the prompt payment of the burial claim. A family member or other person responsible for the social security beneficiary's affairs should do the following:

- Promptly notify Social Security of the beneficiary's death by calling SSA toll-free at 1-800-772-1213. (TTY 1-800-325-0778.)
- If benefits were being paid by check, DO NOT CASH any checks received for the month in which the beneficiary died or thereafter. Return the checks to Social Security as soon as possible.

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Checking account:

In recent years many people have taken advantage of automatic drafts or online bill paying for convenience. When a bill payer dies, those payments may continue and deplete assets that need to be paid to higher priority creditors. If the codes are available, automatic payments should be suspended for a few days, until the survivor talks to his or her lawyer.

If the deceased has named a beneficiary or agent for the account that person may be able to access the deceased person's account without waiting for probate by simply presenting a death certificate. ***Late credit card and mortgage payments:***

Unless the deceased person was already far behind on the mortgage or credit card, the creditor (mortgage company or credit card company) can wait a few weeks until the family sorts things out. Credit card payments should always be stopped until there is time to review the entire financial situation, except in instances when there is a co-debtor. It is important to note that a spouse is not necessarily a co-debtor unless the spouse has agreed, in writing, to pay the account. This is one good reason to never use joint credit cards. Some people believe that the beneficiaries of the Estate of a deceased person are personally liable to pay the credit card bills. This is something you should never do this without speaking to a lawyer first.

Life insurance:

Often, the funeral home will help with life insurance applications. Beneficiaries should know that the Estate is liable for the funeral expenses, so the assignment of life insurance for a funeral may cause a problem if the beneficiaries on the life insurance policy are different from the beneficiaries in the deceased person's Will.

Forwarding mail:

Go to the United States Postal Service website if you need to forward the deceased person's mail. If you need advice about this, the local postman is usually glad to help, or use the following link to find the nearest post office: <https://moversguide.usps.com/>

Appointment with an attorney:

In most cases a survivor or appointed Executor should schedule an appointment with an attorney within 30 days of the death, and bring along the bills and monthly account statements. Of course, if there is a more urgent concern or confusion lawyers are always available to take care of those issues or questions.

Solvent and insolvent probate:

Families of decedents who cannot pay the decedents bills with the estate's assets need to consult an attorney. Procedures in the probate court allow for negotiation with creditors and a specific priority order to pay debts when the assets will not cover the whole amount.

Though this list is lengthy, it is not meant to scare or depress you, but instead to provide you with information that will make this time easier. Many people feel overwhelmed by the death of the loved one because they have to deal with the emotional weight of the loss as well as the enormity of practical considerations that must be made. By understanding what must be done before the time arises, we hope that you are better equipped to deal with it when it does.
